ARSTOCRATS

ARISTOCRATS takes one of the most haunting symbols in Irish writing, the Big House. aristocrats of Ballybeq Hall are O'Donnells, suggesting a link with the rebel Earl of Tyrconnell; and they are also Catholic, which complicates the picture even more, in that the conventional big house of Irish fiction and drama is most often a Protestant ascendancy one. O'Donnells are saturated with history; Ballybeq |Hall is a 'bloody mine field' of recollection, anecdote, reminiscence: Yeats is said to have sat on a certain cushion; Hopkins to have recited his poetry and spilt tea over an arm-rest; and so on. These ghostly presences are invoked for the benefit of Tom Hoffnung, the American sociologist who is researching the influence of the Roman Catholic ascendancy, by Casimir, the only son. Casimir is one of Friel's storytellers, and the history with which the house has surrounded itself provides him with the subject matter of his enthusiasic narrations.

If this house is a Madame Tussaud's of association and unreliable reminiscence Friel's theatre is steeped in the immediacy of human complexity as it reveals itself in the present tense. The result is dramatic writing that can hold in tension memory and the here and now.
