A NOTE ON THE PLAY

Shaw describes the play as a "Fantasia in the Russian manner on English themes," which immediately arouses our interest when we remember that Shaw was an Irishman. The English themes are obvious in the play but it is the manner of their presentation that sets "Heartbreak House" apart from the author's other plays.

We are in England, or indeed Europe, before the 1914-18 war. Captain Shotover keeps a strange house, where contemporary thought is typified and speaks its mind. Vice sits down with virtue and hope pulls up a chair. Whatsoever things are true, honest, just, pure, lovely and of good report; if there be any virtue think on these things. And whatsoever things are not true, not honest, not just, not lovely and not charitable—think, in Heartbreak House, on these things too.

To the poor in heart Shaw gives what Lear requested when his wits had gone—an ounce of civet to sweeten his imagination. But Shotover, with some reason left, cries "Courage will not save you, but it will show that your souls are still alive."

Brave words for us in the nuclear age when science cries Bleep! Bleep! from outer space like a cosmic cuckoo in the heavenly nest.
