Hugh Whitemore (1936-2018)

Hugh Whitemore was an accomplished craftsman for theatre and TV for more than 50 years, moving easily between the disciplines and writing major stage roles (usually based on real-life characters) for Glenda Jackson, Judi Dench, John Gielgud and Derek Jacobi. Having started out with ambitions as a performer, he was told by one of his teachers at RADA, the actor Peter Barkworth, that he had the potential to make a great contribution to theatre – "though perhaps not as an actor".

And so it proved. He was busy in television from the early 1960s, contributing to such important one-off drama series as the BBC's Play for Today and ITV's Armchair Theatre, as well as to popular series such as the soap opera Compact, set in the world of magazine publishing, and No Hiding Place, one of the earliest police and crime fictional programmes.

An inherently funny man, he was a writer of silky dialogue and well-turned narrative who won the respect, as well as the friendship, of fellow writers such as Harold Pinter, Simon Gray and Ronald Harwood. Like Pinter and Harwood, he benefited hugely from his own background and experience as a professional actor; he knew what "worked" and, more importantly, what actors could comfortably say. And his themes, more often than not, were friendship and betrayal.

Whitemore was an only child, born in Tunbridge Wells, Kent. He was educated at King Edward VI school in Southampton. After RADA, and registering little success on regional theatre stages, he began writing. He was twice divorced, and is survived by his third wife, the actor Rohan McCullough, whom he married in 1998, and his son, Tom, from his second marriage, to the literary agent Sheila Lemon.

The Portland Spy Ring

The Portland Spy Ring was a Soviet spy ring operating in England from the 1950s until 1961 and one of the most famous examples of using illegal residents – spies who operate in a foreign country without cover of their embassy. Members included Morris and Lona Cohen aka Peter and Helen Kroger. In 1959, the CIA received letters from a mole saying information was reaching the Russians from Portland, England, where the Royal Navy tested warfare equipment. These letters were passed to MI5.

Suspicion fell on Harry Houghton, a former sailor and now civil servant at the base, who had just bought his fourth car and a house when MI5 put him under surveillance. He and his mistress (Ethel Gee) often went to London to meet a Canadian businessman identified as Gordon Lonsdale. He was frequently at 45 Cranley Drive, Ruislip, visiting an antiquarian bookseller and his wife, Peter and Helen Kroger. In 1960 the Krogers were also put under close but discreet watch.

Ruislip

Ruislip is a suburb in the London Borough of Hillingdon in West London. Prior to 1965 it was in Middlesex. Ruislip lies 13.8 miles (22.2 km) west-northwest of Charing Cross, London. Ruislip appears in the Domesday



Book as *Rislepe*, thought to mean 'leaping place on the river where rushes grow', in reference to the River Pinn. The parish church, St Martin's, dates from the 13th century. The buildings at the northern end of Ruislip High Street form the core of the original village square and are now Grade II listed. The expansion of the Metropolitan Railway from Harrow in the early 20th century acted as a catalyst for development in the area. Ruislip station opened in 1904.

In The News

Five Held on Secrets Act Charges

Three men and two women were arrested in swoops by officers of Scotland Yard's Special Branch at the weekend...

...The five were all charged at Bow-street yesterday that "Between June 1960 and January 1961, in the Metropolitan Police area and elsewhere, they did with other persons unknown, unlawfully conspire to commit breaches of Section 1 of the Official Secrets Act 1961"...

...The five accused are:

- Gordon Arnold Lonsdale, 37, a company director of The White House, a block of luxury flats in Albany Street, Marylebone, London
- Henry Frederick Houghton, 55, Admiralty Civil Servant, of Meadow View-road, Broadway, Weymouth, Dorset
- Ethel Elizabeth Gee, 46, Admiralty Civil Servant, of Hambro Road, Portland, Dorset
- Peter John Kroger, 50, bookseller, of Cranley Drive, Ruislip, Middlesex, and his wife Helen Joyce Kroger, 47, of the same address...

...The Krogers were arrested at their Ruislip home on Saturday afternoon, and the other three were held in dawn swoops yesterday.

Aftermath

Following their trial at the Old Bailey in March 1961, sentences for the group ranged from fifteen years (for Houghton and Gee) to twenty years (for the Krogers) to twenty-five years (for Lonsdale).

Lonsdale was released in 1964 in a spy swap for the British businessman Greville Wynne. The Krogers were exchanged in October 1969 as part of a swap with Gerald Brooke, a British national held on largely falsified claims. The last to be freed were Houghton and Gee, who were given early release in May 1970. Under Boris Yeltsin's government, the Krogers were named heroes of the Russian Federation.

Helen died in December 1992; Peter in June 1995. They were both buried in the KGB's Novokuntsevo Cemetery. The couple were honoured by the Russian government by appearing on stamps in 1998.
